




Poverty *-Abandonment in God*



Dear MI Members and Friends,

In a meeting with seminarians and men and women novices from all over the world in Rome, Pope Francis said: “...but I tell you, it truly grieves me to see a priest or a sister with the latest model of a car: but this can't be! It can't be. You think: “so do we now have to go by bicycle, Father? Bicycles are good! Mons. Alfred rides a bicycle. He goes by bike. I think that cars are necessary because there is so much work to be done, and also in order to get about... but choose a more humble car! And if you like the beautiful one, only think of all the children who are dying of hunger. That's all! Joy is not born from, does not come from, things we possess!” (Paul VI Audience Hall, Saturday, July 6, 2013). Regarding “our” Maximilian, we can say that his poverty is equal to that of St. Francis. They both think and lived this evangelical counsel from the perspective of full reliance upon God's providence.

Being poor is the capital on which the two saints trusted, assured that the Almighty would bless the intentions which he himself inspired. Referring to his father and founder, Father Kolbe wanted the friars to dwell in simple, poor buildings, and to use what was given, not for their personal use, but for those who suffer from any kind of poverty, especially the spiritually poor.

The Immaculate, with her caring presence and intercession, allows her children to achieve extraordinary apostolic goals. We see this in the birth and spread of the Militia of the Immaculata, the Knight, and the City of the Immaculate, expressions of high-profile evangelical apostolate and of considerable expansion. They were built upon the unconditional trust in the Lord and the Blessed Virgin Mary. Then there is personal poverty which must be pursued in the most perfect and authentic way possible. The funds which the Almighty consents us to administer are intended for spreading the Word. The religious is called to a detachment, indicative of his/her fulfillment and conviction in following Christ. St. Maximilian believed that you have to have “*Mary Immaculate as the goal and poverty as the capital: these are two things that Niepokalanów cannot, at any point, abandon. Without this goal it would cease to be Niepokalanów, it would become unfaithful to its mission. Without poverty and dependence upon the Providence of God there is no place for talk of progress, offensive*” (Writing of SMK 299).

The great works of God are born and develop from the full abandonment in his hands. Trust and poverty go hand in hand and are the basis of conformity to the poor Christ and apostolic success, which takes on the maximum missionary thrust.

The simple style of the friar and the MI member is aimed at reaching the

Kingdom. The unconditional trust in the love and providential action of God is the fundamental guideline to walk toward eternal life and to witness to the world the beauty of this way. It is important, therefore, to limit to the maximum personal needs, such as housing, clothing, and food and focus on ones mission, free and consistent. What matters is to answer the call to the apostolate in view of God's Kingdom.

Be poor, even when you use the most powerful means to spread the Gospel and love of the Immaculate, provided that you do not lessen your personal sobriety, the fruit of the unconditional gift of one's life to the Lord. It is necessary to have the most modern means for the apostolate and to preserve a humble and simple lifestyle. This will help ensure fidelity in following and abandonment in God's providence and plan, with full trust that his assistance will never be lacking.

Father Kolbe, remaining in line with the poverty desired by St. Francis and handed down in the Franciscan tradition, contributes innovative ways to practice it. The life of a religious is to be poor and simple, always seeking the presence and will of God. However, to preach the Gospel and the coming of the Kingdom one must give everything they have and, if Providence permits, use all possible resources for the apostolate so that it is effective and *avant garde*. The Friar Minor's style is marked by the essential. The missionary dimension is enriched in the best possible way by the physical and economic strengths of the religious community. The role of Mary is really important for anyone who

wants to be poor, because *"everything that is ours belongs to her (our total consecration). We are called to a perfect poverty and the use of things only as they are necessary and sufficient to reach the end"* (Writings of SMK 486). The Immaculata is, therefore, a point of reference for all who are called to follow the Lord in a life of poverty. When the believer trusts her, he/she lets himself/herself be guided in relation to the use of material goods.



Gloria Vetter moved to Healdsburg, California when she could no longer take care of herself. She passed peacefully on Dec. 31 at the age of 92. She and her late husband, Lou, settled in West Covina, CA and were parishioners at St. Christopher where they raised their children. Gloria was in the Legion of Mary for many many years. She was integral in maintaining the Marian presence and prayer in the parish. She assisted a past pastor, Msgr. Bramble, in sponsoring a refuge Vietnamese Family from Camp Pendleton in the 1970's. She became their American ambassador, signing them up for schools (there were 10 children), finding them medical care, shopping, etc. They called on her for all their needs. The Vietnamese choir will sing at her memorial Mass, March 1.

Gloria became a Fr. Kolbe Volunteer in her later years, desiring to sanctify her life further in prayer and offering and through association with the Fr. Kolbe Missionaries, with whom she had a friendship since their coming to California.
