Trust Her Without Limit

Dear MI Members and Friends,

"Love crosses. The cross is a source of true happiness" (KW 968). Saint Maximilian encourages us to love crosses. They are a fount of happiness, in as much as in sorrow we are able to experience the Lord's faithful and consoling presence; He is near to those who invoke Him in suffering and trial. This is a marvelous and tangible expression of his infinite mercy.

The Immaculata is a sign of God's benevolence for those in physical and spiritual pain. Entrusting ourselves to her without limits, allows us to experience her maternal love, full of affection and care, for those carrying the cross. Maximilian Kolbe's words, written in a letter in 1932, are emblematic: "I beg you, don't worry when contradictions come, but turn everything over to the Immaculata and peacefully do what you can, trusting in her without limit. I know there will be no lack of contradictions or crosses, perhaps even heavier ones, but She can do everything. I write this from personal experience. Crosses teach us, give us further merit, crush us, but at the same time, they exalt us spiritually, and teach us not to trust our own skills and strength, but only the Immaculata." (KW 429)

The Polish Franciscan was an expert in suffering for love of Christ, a dimension of love which characterized his life, and which was crowned by the final heroic act in Auschwitz. He offered to carry the cross prepared for a father of a family.

Some time before his death he wrote: "Crosses are necessary everywhere. Even the Immaculata lived on this earth with crosses, and Jesus did not choose another way. They shouldn't discourage us at all, but on the contrary, the more an instrument is miserable, the more fit to show the Immaculata's goodness and power. Saint Paul doesn't hesitate affirming he glories in his weaknesses, so Christ may manifest His power through them." (KW 609)

Divine charity is particularly enjoyed fatique. lt sustains and accompanies those in suffering. Kolbe knew this well. He lived times of great physical and spiritual exhaustion, because of his lung disease in two phases of his life (from August 11, 1920 until November 3, 1921 and from September 18, 1926 to April 13, 1927). These were hard times. He lived with the thought of his possible death or inactivity for a prolonged time. He entrusted this dramatic condition Immaculata and Divine Benevolence. It's also at that time that he came to

know the Lord's love and fidelity: he experienced great consolation and realized how fundamental the Immaculata's maternal love is, a real anchor of salvation, in the saddest times. Again, in Auschwitz, he felt physical and spiritual exhaustion. Maximilian did forced labor, which weakened his physical strength and permanently ruined his health.

Corporal and spiritual suffering didn't impede him from consoling and accompanying spiritually those imprisoned with him. Although in conditions, precarious notwithstanding the risk punishment, St. Maximilian spoke words of comfort to his brother prisoners. This was an expression of Christ and the Immaculata's love that he always sensed deeply in his heart. Invoking the Immaculata, for Kolbe, was a fount of consolation and peace. He voluntarily entrusted his suffering to Her, certain of the Mother of God's nearness and help. This poem in the Madonna's honor, offered now for reflection, is truly significant.

> May those suffering in body and soul take heart, sure of the merciful love of God.

I love thee, I love thee, Immaculata, every day I raise prayers to thee: indeed you are my beloved Mother, dearer to me than all earthly delights.

You know how I yearn for thee, know how fondly I love thee:
When shall I join thee in heaven and kiss, O Mother, thy hand?
Though I long and yearn for thee, I would wait here patiently, until the Lord has set the hour of my death and plucked my anxious soul from my body.

Bur for as long as I have to live in the world, Oh my Mother, I beg thee: in the short period of my temporal life

let me bear it all for thee, serenely.
Help me to bear, beloved Mother
all the crosses, the humiliations,
so that through this suffering I may,
one day
glorify thee in Heaven, Oh
Immaculata!" (ef. KW 999)

IFNT - "A time for Conversion"

Pope Francis

"After receiving the Good News told to her by the Archangel Gabriel, Mary, in her Magnificat, prophetically sings of the mercy whereby God chose her. The Virgin of Nazareth, betrothed to Joseph, thus becomes the perfect icon of the Church which evangelizes, for she was, and continues to be, evangelized by the Holy Spirit, who made her virginal womb fruitful. In the prophetic tradition, mercy is strictly related – even on the etymological level – to the maternal womb (rahamim) and to a generous, faithful and compassionate goodness (hesed) shown within marriage and family relationships.

For all of us, then, the season of Lent in this Jubilee Year is a favorable time to overcome our existential alienation by listening to God's word and by practicing the works of mercy. In the corporal works of mercy we touch the flesh of Christ in our brothers and sisters who need to be fed, clothed, sheltered, visited; in the spiritual works of mercy – counsel, instruction, forgiveness, admonishment and prayer – we touch more directly our own sinfulness. The corporal and spiritual works of mercy must never be separate. By touching the flesh of the crucified Jesus in the suffering, sinners can receive the gift of realizing that they too are poor and in need. By taking this path, the "proud", the "powerful" and the "wealthy" spoken of in the Magnificat can also be embraced and undeservedly loved by the crucified Lord who died and rose for them. This love alone is the answer to that yearning for infinite happiness and love that we think we can satisfy with the idols of knowledge, power and riches. Yet the danger always remains that by a constant refusal to open the doors of their hearts to Christ who knocks on them in the poor, the proud, rich and powerful will end up condemning themselves and plunging into the eternal abyss of solitude which is Hell. The pointed words of Abraham apply to them and to all of us: "They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them" (Lk 16:29). Such attentive listening will best prepare us to celebrate the final victory over sin and death of the Bridegroom, now risen, who desires to purify his Betrothed in expectation of his coming.

Let us not waste this season of Lent, so favorable a time for conversion! We ask this through the maternal intercession of the Virgin Mary, who, encountering the greatness of God's mercy freely bestowed upon her, was the first to acknowledge her lowliness (cf. Lk 1:48) and to call herself the Lord's humble servant (cf. Lk 1:38).





Souls of the Departed

January 16 Margaret Fry (from Covina, CA) passed away peacefully in Nevada, surrounded by her children and grandchildren who were praying the rosary. She was 95 years old. Margaret taught Marian spirituality and womanly virtue to the first group of YMI full-time Volunteers in southern California. She was a Third Order Carmelite.

Fr. Provincial Joseph Gallardo, OAR (from Cypress, CA) passed away at the age of 56 at the Province of St. Augustine House in West Orange, New Jersey on January 25. Fr. Joseph was the first young man full time YMI Volunteer in southern California in the late 1970's. When elected Provincial for the Augustinian Recollects he said he received this calling due to his formation in the YMI. The first things he asked his Order to do was to

increase Eucharistic Adoration and to re-consecrate themselves to Mother Mary. He died on the sixth anniversary of his mother's death. He was buried at his Order's cemetery in Oxnard, CA.

From a letter he wrote June 2014: ""How glorious is that kingdom where all the saints rejoice with Christ; clothed in white robes, they follow the lamb wherever he goes." The Church prays this antiphon for the canticle of Mary on the Solemnity of All Saints. The saints behold God, and from their place in heaven they spur us on to victory and faithfulness and remind us that we are called to holiness."
